SOME PERSIAN LUSTRE CERAMICS

IN

Dr. ALI PASHA IBRAHIM'S COLLECTION

On January 28, 1947, Dr. Aly Pasha Ibrahim died at his Cairo home, at the age of sixty-seven. He was the leading surgeon in Egypt and was the Dean of the Faculty of Medicine, then Minister of Public Health, and finally Rector of Fouad I University and was still holding this function when he died.

During the last forty years of his life, he was collecting works of Muslim Art, particularly carpets and ceramics. His collection of Oriental rugs, especially Persian and Turkish is the best in Egypt. And, indeed, it is one of the best in the whole world. The Ottoman Turkish style of Muslim Art is splendidly represented, in Dr. Ali Pasha Ibrahim's private museum, by a considerable number of panels of tiles and tens of dishes, dating from the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries. His museum includes also a very fine collection of Persian ceramics from the ninth to the seventeenth century. Most of the different periods and techniques are represented in this collection and sometimes by pieces, which have acquired a wide reputation in the world of Muslim Art.

The collection of Fatimid lustre ware in Dr. Ali Pasha Ibrahim's museum is remarkable, because of the signed pieces which it contains proving that this ware was produced in Egypt by Egyptian artists.

The Found I University decided to publish a comprehensive study of Ali Pasha Ibrahim's collections. The present article contains few items of the Persian lustre ware. Bowl.—White ground decorated with gold lustre. A seated figure with a pointed cap is playing a guitar; densely stippled background of gold flecks. On the reverse circles separated by stylized branches.

Bowl.—White ground decorated with gold lustre. A seated figure on a densely stippled background of gold flecks. It obviously has some relation to the piece No. 1 in the collection (Fig. 1), but it has made less concession to naturalism. On the reverse circles and conventionalized branches with the Arabic word '5,' (blessing) in Kufic.







To energy of line and pose has been added the energy of suggested movement. The rim and background patterns are composed of leaves and graceful scrolls, some of which contain bird figures.












